SIXTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR - YEAR A

I WILL NOT LEAVE YOU ALONE AND ABANDONED; I WILL COME BACK TO YOU (John 14:18)

These poignant words of Jesus to his apostles at the Last Supper are addressed to us today. Corona virus has instilled such fear into our society – the economic and the social world are in upheaval, we can't make plans for the future, we don't know when it will all end. These are indeed dark times.

As I think of this darkness, my mind goes back to the storm at sea in Mark's Gospel. (I've always had close associations with the sea since childhood, and I know very well what a severe storm is like). When the disciples set out from land everything was calm and normal. But suddenly, out of the blue, a violent storm arose – it was so severe that even these experienced fishermen were frightened out of their wits. The waves around them were so high that their skill and vast experience were of little use to them. They did their best to prevent the boat going to broadside to the waves, but it was all in vain. And all this time there was Jesus asleep in the stern. In panic, they woke him up and his first words were strange, but very encouraging: 'why were you afraid', 'have you no faith'. Did you not know that when I was with you, you had nothing to fear.

Yes, Jesus is with us in this crisis we are facing – he may seem to be asleep, but he is very alert. Of course, he wants us to take all the human means we can to fight the virus, just as he expected the disciples to use their skill and experience to prevent the boat from capsizing. But ultimately it is he who will calm the storm. He has both the power to intervene and, above all, the willingness to do so, but he will do it in his own way, and within his own timeframe – if we just believe and trust in him.

And perhaps he is using this evil to bring about a new society which is more human and caring, where the values of the Gospel are more to the forefront in how we live, where we'll look beyond money and pleasure and worldly 'success' in our search for an ultimate purpose in our lives.
