SOME THOUGHTS ON CHRISTIAN LIVING

Four Important Qualities in a True Friendship - I. Vulnerability/Openness

A friendship usually begins with a natural affinity I feel towards another. But a deep friendship will develop only if I am ready to risk a certain level of self-disclosure. This entails a willingness to share something of myself – not only my ideas, but also my feelings and experiences and special personal moments in my life. To refuse to take this risk and choose an overly-private and independent life is to miss out on the great opportunities for growth and happiness that a true friendship can bring.

But sharing in depth needs to be approached very delicately. It asks for a climate of absolute trust, for I will reveal personal secrets only to those whom I know will listen sympathetically, will never divulge them to others, or judge or reject me because of what I tell them.

Because friendship is a sacred thing the sharing-level must be reverential and disciplined. My sharing must be of a kind that invites the other to respond, but it is never demanding or pressurizing. It takes place in a way that leaves the other free to dictate the depth of sharing he/she is happy with. Only on this condition will friendship grow into the lovely gift that God wants it to be.

Really deep friendships are rare, and when they happen they should be greatly treasured. When the level of sharing is deep and respectful the feeling of mutual enrichment is very great. I feel I can be my true self with the other – safe, relaxed and free. There's no need to hide or pretend. I know I'm accepted just as I am, with my special personality and character and temperament, as well as with all my failings and idiosyncrasies.
