Synod In Our Parish

We hope to begin our Synodal conversations later this month. We are grateful for those who have responded to the invitation to take part in the sessions and encourage others to do so. The diocese tells us that 'one of the key aims of the Synod process is to give us a new way of listening, to one another and to the Spirit'. With this in mind I would like to offer a few suggestions on the Synodal process of <u>listening</u>. I will do this in the newsletters of this week and next week.

Listening - in the Synodal Process

To many people, listening does not come naturally. It is an art that must be learned. Listening in a synodal way means listening with the mind and heart, as well as with the ears. Often in our listening we hear only the facts of what another is saying, not her/his fears, anxieties, hopes, aspirations etc. The reason is that we're not really receptive to the views of the other. We're rigidly entrenched in our own views and prejudices and this makes us deaf to different views. We become blind to different perspectives and nuances of the issue being talked about. Rather than listening with an open mind we're preparing our response to the other while he/she is still speaking.

Listening, then, is a discipline we must cultivate and it involves a certain level of 'dying to self', a readiness to be humble enough to change my views if what I have heard warrants this. It entails empathetically entering into the mind-set of others and trying to see an issue from their point of view. Doing this is evidence of an honest search for the truth. But it is not only this; it's an exercise in politeness. It is evidence of a deep respect for the other.
