Our Synod conversations will be concerned with Parish matters and also with matters concerning the Universal Church.

THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

Synodal Dialogue

We reflected last week on the art of listening graciously. We will continue with our reflection this week.

A crucial element in listening is respecting the other person. Just because she/he has not the same views as I have, he/she is often seen as a rival. But she/he is not – she/he is just different. And we must give him/her permission to be different. We must try to enter his/her world and see the issue from her/his point of view.

In responding, this respect must be uppermost in our minds. If I have a different view I should, in the interest of truth, express it — but not in an arrogant and overly-assertive way, but humbly - as just my opinion. On this point, St. Paul gives very good advice; he tells us to 'speak the truth in love'. Yes, speak the truth, but not in an angry or confrontational way or in a way that demeans the other. Often what causes friction or misunderstanding in a conversation is not what is said, but the way it is said.

Real synodal dialogue will happen only when we acknowledge that we are all different individuals, with different views, personalities, temperaments, backgrounds etc. Because of this, differences and tensions are inevitable. Growth towards being a genuine community depends on how we manage these. They are not necessarily barriers to a fruitful dialogue; on the contrary, they can be catalysts towards real community growth. What we seek in a genuine community is unity, not uniformity. The real test of a community is the way it manages diversity - not just tolerating it, but encouraging it. If we suppress diversity and insist only a bland unanimity, our community will lose its dynamism. And. ever worse, we are opening the way to a subtle form of dictatorship. If that happens, members will experience only fear and apathy. They will either become alienated and leave, or become disillusioned and hostile.

This is why Pope Francis is so opposed to clericalism, and one feels that the main purpose of his calling of the Synod is the elimination of what he calls the 'cancer of clericalism'. He is setting the framework for the emergence of a Church that is creative and fruitful, that is truly a community in the Spirit.
