THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

St. Paul's reading today describes <u>hope</u> as one of the three things that will last, alongside faith and love. Without hope we would give up completely when troubles come, and surrender to depression and despair. How important it can be to hold on to hope, never to forget that bad times do pass and that time can be a great healer.

Perhaps the thing that made Jesus so important to the people of his time, that made them hang on his words, was the fact that his message was all about hope. He taught those who felt rejected and alone that his Father, God, never turned anyone away and never abandoned any soul. In today's Gospel Jesus told his listeners in the synagogue that even lepers and gentiles found favour with God. Some who heard him became angry – angry that he was offering hope to those they saw as outcasts and their enemies. But Jesus revealed that God denies the gift of hope to no one.

So, as we reflect on the coming of spring and the beginnings of new life in the earth – and hopefully the beginning of the end of Covid - let us ask God to renew the gift of hope in ourselves and to bring light and life to the parts of our lives that are dark and in need of encouragement.
