THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

There is a story from the ancient Desert Fathers which goes as follows: Some robbers came once to a hermitage and said: 'we've come to take everything out of your cell'. The hermit said 'take whatever you can see'. So they took what they found in the cell, and went away. But they missed a little bag that was hidden in a corner. The hermit picked it up and ran after them shouting: 'my sons, you missed this; take it'. They were amazed at the action of the hermit and restored everything, and did penance before him. They said to each other: 'this is truly a man of God'.

This little story exemplifies a perfect, literal fidelity to the words of Jesus. We find it delightful, and it makes us smile. We smile because although we find this hermit utterly admirable, it would never occur to us to imitate him. It is the same with other injunctions of Jesus in today's gospel, like forgiveness of enemies. They seem utterly unreasonable, and yet our 'better selves', our redeemed selves, greatly admire them and find them hugely attractive. A great spiritual writer, Anthony Padovano, wrote these memorable words: 'the most crippling heresy of our time is [not one of doctrine but] the denial of Jesus as normative in our lives'.

The purpose of reading today's gospel is not to make us feel guilty, but to inspire us, and to re-kindle our desire for the real holiness to which Christ is calling us. We are at Mass today to express and nourish this desire by coming to Jesus and receiving him in the Eucharist. For ultimately, we will find the strength to achieve this kind of holiness only if we receive Jesus regularly in the Eucharist and learn to be deeply prayerful people.
