As our 'Thought for the Week' this week points out, Lent is a time for repentance, for examining our way of life and moving more resolutely towards a more Christ-like way of living. The Penance Service offers us a special opportunity for this, as well as the opportunity to avail of the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession, as it used to be called).

UKRAINE: The Bishops of England and Wales have made an urgent appeal for prayers this Lent for a speedy end to the war in Ukraine. We must also pray for the people in Ukraine at this time, and the very many who are leaving their homes and relatives for sanctuary in neighboring countries. THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

True Repentance

A fig tree planted in a vineyard should have ideal soil conditions to produce abundant fruit, certainly after three years. Sadly, the tree in the parable today has remained fruitless. Initially, the owner of the vineyard wants the gardener to cut it down as it is taking up precious ground. However, the gardener appeals to his master to let it be for another year, during which time he will dig round and manure it.

The point of the story is that, just as the gardener was patient with the fig tree, so God is patient with us and gives us ample chances to bear fruit. For our part, we must not squander these chances. We must repent.

But what is repentance? It is not regret or remorse or guilt feelings over something we did in the past. Such feelings can tend to lock us into the past rather than lead us towards a future God wants us to embrace. The focus of true repentance is not on the past but on the future. It is a *decision* – a decision to change direction, to turn away from where we were heading and move more resolutely towards God. It is a turning away from darkness towards light. It is a joyous journey towards home, not a sad departure from where we were. It is allowing God to draw us towards himself and transform us into 'children of light'.

For this to happen we must be willing to let go of the past and open our hearts to the 'new person' God wants us to be.
