Synodal Discussion Report of Bishops of England and Wales

(continued from last week)

The synodal reports confirm the centrality of the Eucharist in our lives. There is regular mention of the need to re-examine sacramental disciplines, above all, those that restrict access to Matrimony, Holy Orders and the Eucharist. Although there is no longer a 'distinction between Jew and Gentile', restrictions are seen by many as denying this equality. There was also a minority voice opposed to any relaxation of the sacramental disciplines.

There is repeated frustration at perceived inconsistency in the definition of 'practising Catholic' in school admission policies, and at the apparent contradiction of priestly celibacy and former Anglican priests being married, and in the confusion around the area of marriage law, especially when so many are declined sacraments because of their marital status.

Marginalised Groups – Women

The place of women in the Church was the cause of passionate, repeated and strongly expressed concern. It was a constant theme, occupying substantial sections of every diocesan report, and should be regarded as one the headline findings of the synod in England and Wales. On the whole, women were not considered a marginalized minority so much as a silenced, unrecognized majority whose gifts lie unwrapped and ignored in the parish culture. Despite being the 'lifeblood' of the Church, women are seen as excluded from leadership and ministry roles in ways that are damaging to the Church's mission and credibility. The Church must make better use of the gifts that women have – including in decision-making and planning. The contrast was drawn between the synod meeting – places of sharing and mutual respect and the structures of the Church, seen as male-dominated, patriarchal, and exclusive of women. Many feel hurt and angry about this.

Despite many calls for women to be ordained as deacons and priests, most discernment about the valuing of women was not focused on ordination but on the need to reflect on the power and gift of women in the Church. There were many calls for women to be able to preach, for the Church to have women exercise leadership roles, and for the service of authority in the Church to reflect the charisma of women. Without this service as leaders and in ministries, the witness of the Church is weakened, and its credibility undermined.
