THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

Friendship (continued)

We have been reflecting on some of the essential qualities in a genuine friendship. We have mentioned openness and respect, and today we will look at a third quality – <u>Tolerance/Acceptance</u>.

Likely, in our younger days we had a very naïve understanding of friendship. We thought of it as a comfortable togetherness, free of all tensions and differences. This view was not realistic. Because friendship involves individuals who are unique, tensions are inevitable. Growth towards a lasting friendship depends on how tensions and differences are managed.

God has made each of us with our own unique personality and talents, with our weaknesses and idiosyncrasies as well our strengths. Healthy friendships acknowledge this. A test of a friendship's maturity is the extent to which it allows each person to express his/her own unique self. The Spirit that has brought us together is the Spirit of freedom, and therefore a basic question I must ask myself is whether or not I'm providing the atmosphere where the other person is free to express wishes and views that are opposed to mine. If not, there is likely to be some element of intolerance or power-play at work in the relationship.

By nature, we all tend to be narcissistic. A basic instinct in me draws me to befriend another person, not as *other*, but as the image of myself that I want to see reflected in him/her. But if I like another only on this condition then I'm not really liking the other person at all. I'm liking the image of myself that I want to see reflected in him/her. In other words, I'm indulging in a sophisticated form of self-love. (*We'll continue with this theme next week*)
