THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

FRIENDSHIP (continued)

We continue with the Tolerance/Aspect of friendship because it focuses on an element in friendship which is frequently forgotten.

A genuine relationship is one that allows the other person to be different. My friend is 'other' than me, with her/his particular personality, different interests and outlook on life etc. I need to see differences as a gift to our friendship, not a threat. Entering the world of the other and opening myself to his/her vision of life can be exciting and life-enhancing if we choose to make it so. It draws me out of my set little world of ideas and habits, out of narrow-mindedness and self-centeredness and gives me the courage to embrace the new challenges and opportunities that life with another (or with others) is offering me.

Teilhard de Chardin makes the profound statement that 'union (true friendship) differentiates'. What we seek in friendship of not a bland uniformity that seeks to eliminate all differences. This, in time, would make life dull and boring. We must welcome unity in diversity and if we embrace it, it can bring a creative and enriching tension to our relationships. That's why one of the most basic requirements in friendship is tolerance or acceptance – giving the other freedom to be him/herself, to be the weak, limited and fragile person that she/he is. And this is surely the most reassuring tribute I can pay another, the greatest gift I can give her/him – to let the other feel that she/he is my friend not because of because of her/his wealth or status or intellectual ability, not for what she/he can do or give or achieve, but simply because he/she is just the kind of person that he/she is.
