Thought for the Week

The first and second readings in today's Mass give us an indication as to the kind of king that Jesus would turn out to be. In the passage from Samuel, God declares King David to be a shepherd, as well as a leader of the people. We see Paul telling Colossians how the kingdom of Christ transcends time and space but also how Jesus will make the ultimate sacrifice for the world and for the human race.

Jesus would indeed be a good shepherd, caring for and guiding the whole flock but rejoicing especially in finding the one lost sheep. He would make the ultimate sacrifice, out of love for the world and its people. A few short weeks before we will celebrate once again the birth of Christ, we see in the gospel how he was a king that was born to die, as indeed we all are. Many people including those close to him would have been expecting a great and powerful king who would vanquish the occupying force and place his followers in positions of greatness. Jesus, through his inglorious death on the cross, having been tortured, mocked, surrounded by criminals and abandoned by his disciples, offers us liberation of a different sort: liberation from everything that prevents us from living life in all its richness and fullness. And just as he invites the criminal on the cross beside him to a place in heaven, so does he invite all of us to a place in paradise.

Jesus Christ, king of the Universe, how our world needs such a king at the current time.
